"The toughest physical experience of my life!"

Here is Phil MacDonald's story about his recent Himalaya trek to Everest Base Camp

On the 25th January I left Heathrow to start on the long journey to Everest Base Camp. It was something I had always wanted to do, yet something I didn't anticipate enjoying for one moment! I felt I would only truly appreciate what I had done on my return and every moment in between was going to be spent wondering why I had paid good money to put myself through all this.

That said, I arrived at Kathmandu airport with a mixture of excitement and nervousness and met the rest of the team. On our first day there we took a half day tour of the capital taking in the different sights and cultures along the way. For many in the group the sheer difference in life here was on such a big scale I think it really shocked them and was something maybe people weren't fully prepared for. Next day we took an early flight on a 16 seater airplane to





Lukla airport. With its tiny airstrip on the side of a mountain, landing an airplane there is an aquired skill and thankfully for us our pilot seemed to possess it.

We started trekking that very day, albeit an easy day in comparison, with mainly downhill stretches to our first night's lodge. That evening we had a briefing which essentially told us that the next day wasn't going to be easy and that there would be a section after around 2 hours of walking which would be 3 hours 'steep up'. This, it seemed was not to be a lie and was one of the hardest things I have ever done. It was not so much to be a fitness thing but more a breathing thing. Even at this altitude everyone was struggling to breathe and it was a huge struggle for everyone to get up the hill. Eventually however, everyone made it up to Namche Bazaar and once again we all cursed ourselves for paying for the pleasure of putting ourselves through this. The following days were much the same, with a mixture of ups and downs both mentally and physically but there was a real sense of drive towards our target. As we got higher the terrain dramatically changed from lush green forest laden with trees and flowing rivers to a barren mix of dirt, dust and rock. Eventually we came round to 'Base Camp Day' and a 5.30am wake up call and we were out of the lodges at Loubouche to start our trek. We were told that today was going to be hard. Obviously having nothing but trust for this statement now, we soldiered onto Gorak Shep. We arrived here at around 10am and had a quick lunch before our trek to the base camp. We were shown where base camp was and it literally looked just round the corner but was apparently 3 hours trek away. As we began to walk, it became apparent as to why, as the entire time was spent looking at the ground trying to work out where you could put your feet without twisting anything. The terrain was hard work and I felt very lucky that the weather was so good, as if those rocks were slippery as well it would have made it 100 times harder. As it was, 3 hours later we made it to Everest Base Camp. All of us had made it and there was a distinct sigh of relief from everyone in the group. We all shook hands, took photos and looked around us to really appreciate what we had achieved. Unfortunately, after this I still had around 5 days to get back to Lukla and now mentally, I was shot. I had done what I had set out to achieve, my goal suddenly changed from reaching base camp at 5365m amongst the most impressive and majestic mountains in the Himalayas, to going home back to work and normal everyday life.

I would like to send heartfelt thanks to all of you who donated to benefit the Starlight Foundation. Your kindness helped inspire me to not only push through the hard times but enjoy the good times that bit more. The total raised is around £1,900 so far. ALLOTMENT ASSOCIATION

There is no such thing as an absolute date in gardening, as temperatures and conditions vary according to where you are in the country. Winter comes earlier to Scotland than Devon, so adjust for our situation and weather. April is great, the soil is warming up and Spring should be here. Keep an eye on the weather forecast though, a cold snap and snow are not unknown in April. Keeping horticultural fleece on standby in case of cold weather is a good idea.

In the 'Hungry Gap' between the last of the winter crops and start of the early crops, there are still a few things available, late sprouting broccoli for example and perhaps some early salad crops from the greenhouse.

Re-check stored crops. On a fine day, empty out the potato sacks and check for rot. If you've strung onions, watch out for the odd rotten one and remove it before it spreads.

General Gardening Tip: If you have some horticultural fleece, peg it over ground a week or so before planting. A small rise in soil temperature can make a big difference.

Sowing, Planting and Cultivating: Weeds are springing into action so keep the hoe going. A sharp hoe is the best friend a gardener can have. Slide it back and forth slightly below the surface of the soil and you'll stop the weed seedlings in their tracks. Hoeing is also good in the event of drought as the disturbed soil surface stops the water being sucked to the surface by capillary action and evaporating in dry winds. Sow beetroot, peas, broad beans, broccoli, Brussels sprouts and other brassicas, leeks and salads, etc.

Cover carrots with a fleece, ensuring the edges are buried to stop carrot root fly from laying eggs by your carrots. The eggs hatch in larvae that burrow into the carrot root, killing the plant or at least ruining the crop.

Plant Outdoors: Globe and Jerusalem artichokes, onion and shallot sets, asparagus. Easter is the traditional potato planting time.

Sow in Greenhouse or on Windowsill: aubergine, celery, outdoor cucumbers, tomatoes (if you've not already done so). A windowsill tip is to stick some silver cooking foil onto cardboard and place on the inside to reflect light back onto the seedlings.

Sow Outdoors under Cloche: French beans, lettuce, sweet corn. Alternative sweet corn method: lay the seeds on damp kitchen paper in an ice-cream carton or a Tupperware box, then place a layer of paper over. Put the cover on the box and check daily. As soon as small white shoots appear, plant the seed half to an inch deep in a 3" pot of general purpose compost in the greenhouse. When shoots are about an inch high, plant out under cloche, being careful not to disturb the root as sweet corn hates root disturbance. Sweetcorn needs a lot of nitrogen and a teaspoon of dried blood per plant or water with urea (a chemical, do not pee on them!)

Many of the crops you can sow directly will also benefit from cloching, or being started off in modules in a cool greenhouse or cold frame and then planted out later.

Fruit

Plant Strawberries out now. Remove flowers in the first year to gain larger crops later. An easy way to gain strawberry plants is to plant the runners into pots and when rooted cut the runner. You need to replace them every three to five years.

Hand pollinate peaches and nectarines. Tickle the flowers with a small paint brush to spread the pollen. Cover if a cold spell threatens.


A good layer of compost around the base of fruit trees will ensure they have the nutrition to provide another good crop for you.

Gardener's Pests

The gardener's worst enemies are awakening. Slugs and snails are coming out now to munch entire rows of succulent young seedlings overnight, so take action now!

SIDNEY HUBERT ROLT

24th September 1924 - 25th February 2009



Sid was born in Front Street, the youngest of 8 children, 4 boys and 4 girls, the children of Maud and Arther Rolt. Sid attended Slip End School up to the age of 14, when he went to work at Jim Walker's farm. During the Second World War Sid served in the local Home Guard. He met Winifred Coulson at a dance at Luton Hoo and they married a few years later in Newcastle. They set up home at Farley Cottages, which was to be his home until he died.

Sid loved to play football playing for Slip End United with his brother. During one match Sid took a heavy tackle which broke his ankle. Jeff Wilson recalls hearing Sid's ankle crack! Maybe that is how he got the nickname 'Tackle'.

Sid was a builder by trade and he worked for several local building firms, including Nevilles, Claydons and Garretts. After a day's work he would work on the farm until late.

Sid and Win had two daughters, Patricia and Debra. Win moved back to Newcastle with Debra after divorce from Sid. Sid had a smallholding in front of his cottage where he kept pigs, chickens and geese. When piglets were born he would stay up all night, putting small piglets into a cardboard box and looking after them indoors by the fire. They would stay there and he would feed them until they were strong enough to go outside.

Sid had a weakness for meat puddings and bacon dumplings! I remember him often going back to his mum's for dinner in the evenings.

Sid loved to talk and liked doing odd jobs and bricklaying for anyone around the village. He is sadly missed by his daughters, five grandchildren and three great grandchildren as well as other relatives and friends







PARISH COUNCIL NOTES

The concept of the Community Projects Group was approved at the Public Meeting on 16th March, so the work of the Group begins. The aims of the Group are:

- ◆ To be a voice for the residents of this community regarding the future of their parish.
- ◆ To enable all residents to take part in projects and activities that will enhance the quality of life through the provision of social, cultural and practical amenities, opportunities and events.
- ◆ To promote opportunities for existing local business, charitable and interest groups to explore the benefits of working together and raising awareness of what they currently do.
- ◆ To be a forum for ideas, discussions and suggestions that will lead to a vital and relevant Parish Plan for our area.
- ◆ To be an "umbrella" group providing administrative and management support for the existing Slip End Youth Club, Slip End Chatty Club and Slip End Village Day Team and other such groups which may be formed in the future.
- ◆ To receive funds from the Parish Council to distribute amongst local charitable and not-for-profit organisations as agreed by Committee members.
- ◆ To take over from the Parish Council the distribution of Christmas gifts to residents of retirement age, with funds from the Parish Council augmented by donations from local businesses and groups.
- ◆ To actively seek funding to ensure the long term viability of this group. This may be via grants from the public or private sector. Funding will be used not only for projects but also for the employment of administrative staff and volunteers, to run the group, and to supply the resources they need.

The meeting also agreed to a Parish Plan being constructed which will guide not just the Community Projects Group but the Parish Council as well over the next five years or so.



The first meeting is planned for 30 March when committee members will be elected. I am grateful to the people who came forward volunteering to take part in our new venture.

To make the plan truly representative of what everyone would like to see carried out, some new ideas for collecting residents views will be undertaken. Please do take part in this when you are approached and if you would like to be involved more, we would love to hear from you. It doesn't matter whether you are 8, 98 or somewhere in between.

All residents and businesses are welcome to join the meetings which will be posted on the web site and the Notice Boards around the Parish

If you would like to see the two presentations given at the meeting, they are on www.slipend.co.uk. Just locate the Community Projects page. You might be surprised at what has already been achieved, the funding available for the Group and some of the ideas put forward!!!

Speaking of the website, in the "Contact Us" section of the St Andrews, Community Projects and Parish Council pages, there is a form which you can complete to contact any of the three organisations, make a comment offer advice or criticism. Completed forms will be responded to and when appropriate, with the writer's consent, published on the site.

Peter King, the webmaster, is in the process of setting up a new style diary of events. The idea is that someone from each organisation will have access to their own organisation's diary which they can use to record meetings, events and the like. All of the diaries will be automatically merged into one so that anyone looking at the events calendar will be able to see everything that is happening in the Parish. It will also help organisations when planning events to ensure that there are no clashes. To make things easier recurring events can be added in one go so for instance the Friendship Club that meets every Thursday only need to have this added once and it will show every Thursday from now until the end of time! Roads

Like most parishes, our roads have suffered the ravages of winter with the resultant pothoes. Steve Fuell has had meetings with Bedfordshire Highways and arranged for repairs to be carried out. Woodside Road will have its surface repaired and similar work was planned for the Pepperstock end of Front Street. However, after Steve's meeting (and no doubt badgering) he now understands that stretch is going to be resurfaced and it is hoped the resurfacing works will be extended down Half Moon Lane. This work should be completed in May.

Core Plan Development

I received the following note from Richard Stay following the recent JPTC meeting which considered the proposed development along the eastern boundary of the motorway. Although the Parish Council has not received detailed plans of the development, this decision would appear to rule out the possibility of local large scale development for the time being. Richard writes:

When John Prescott was in office some years ago he set a target of 3 million new homes to be built in the South East of England by 2030, This policy has now worked its way through the system and a target of over 42,000 houses was set by Government for

the South Bedfordshire and Luton area by 2030.

Locally we had two choices, to say no at which point a development quango would have been set up and we would have had development imposed on us, or work with Government and apply as much local influence over development as possible.

The local planning authorities, South Beds, Luton and the County Council decided they wanted some influence over the plans and set up a Joint Planning & Transport Committee (JPTC) which had delegated planning and transport decision making powers. This was set up with 6 members from Bedfordshire and 6 from Luton and a rotating Chairman.

The past two years has been spent considering how this huge target should be met and identifying the most appropriate areas for development, most of the area being currently Green Belt in any case.

All this work resulted in a number of options that were widely consulted on some time ago and on Friday 20th March a draft core strategy went to the JPTC for a decision on further consultation on a preferred set of options. The committee decided on a majority of 9 for, 1 abstention and 2 against to agree the core strategy, which will deliver over 40,000 houses by 2030, most of which will go to the North of Luton / Dunstable and inside a new Dunstable - Luton Northern Bypass between the A5 and the M1.

A few weeks ago developers, who own options on most of the Green Belt between Caddington, Slip End and the M1, put forward a proposal for 5,500 houses and significant commercial development along with a swimming pool and a football stadium on most of the land between us and Luton.

This is a proposal that has come out of the blue which was not part of the options consulted on by the JPTC.

As a result of the JPTC decision it will make it much harder for the developers to press forward with their proposals for Luton West, but we cannot be complacent. If there is a change of Government next year then the rules may change around housing targets, but we may at that point be too far down the track to make significant changes to development in South Bedfordshire.

Police Priorities

I believe Richard and Ruth will be standing for the Central Bedfordshire election which will be held early in June and that Philip and Sally are taking a well deserved rest from District affairs. Fortunately we are not losing Philip completely, as he is continuing as a Parish Councillor.
