Parish Council Notes

I would like to begin by saying "thank you" to all those who contacted Councillors following the traffic calming items which appeared in the last two issues. Thanks also to the seventeen residents who attended last month's meeting. I think it is safe to say the debate about traffic calming has begun.

While there are those residents who are happy for the Parish Council Tax to be increased for several years by £25000 over what is normally needed, to pay for the measures, equally there are those who are against such a move. While there are those in favour of traffic calming again there are those against.

You will recall the background to all this comes from the Parish Plan which was produced as a result of a questionnaire being delivered to every home in the Parish.

The top two priorities identified by residents were speeding and parking. The full Plan document can be seen by following the link on the Community Projects Group page on www.slipend.co.uk a hard copy is also available to see in the Parish Pubs.

David Bowie, Head of Traffic Management at Central Beds Council attended the December meeting. The main points which David explained were that he and the Highways Department can devise a calming scheme using various methods to reduce the speed of traffic to whatever is wanted. He quoted two roads where traffic humps were taken out for resurfacing works to be undertaken; and subsequently put back following pressure from residents concerned that speeding had returned.

David confirmed we can consider a one way system in Summer Street, the Pepperstock, junction a residential parking scheme, putting in yellow lines around the school and other parking hotspots. He went on to say that with the new

Automatic Number Plate Recognition camera cars, parking enforcement could be carried out.

The meeting was told that at the moment Central Beds Council is match funding those Parishes which undertake such projects so we may not have to bear the full cost ourselves.

At the January meeting, Councillors felt it right to commission a feasibility study, which will be carried out by Central Beds Council, to produce two or three costed schemes covering all the issues mentioned. The fee will be around £3000 - £5000 and come from funds already held.

Full details of the schemes and the cost of each will be presented in a number of different ways so that residents can decide what, if anything, they would like to see implemented Other than the undertaking of the feasibility study, no work will take place until after residents have been consulted.

It was also agreed by majority vote, 5 to 1, that the additional £25000 in Parish Council Tax will not be collected until after the consultation process has been completed. It is anticipated that both the feasibility study and subsequent consultation can all be completed before the end of this year.

In other words it is hoped that by this time next year we will all have decided whether to put up with the speeding and parking problems or put our hands in our pockets and pay to have the problems fixed. If it is decided to proceed, then the earliest the Parish Council Tax will be increased for the project is April 2014.

Some interesting data concerning the number of vehicles travelling at speeds in excess of 35mph in one week of April 2009, source Bedfordshire Police: Church Road 10,053 Markyate Road 11,018. In a similar week in June 2009, Front Street 3,582. No figures are available for Woodside Road at present. I shall endeavour to obtain up to date figures.

The Healing Nature of God

We are now well into the New Year but may I still wish you every blessing for 2013. So far during the new year at St. Andrew's, we have been looking at readings about Jesus from Luke's Gospel.

Luke was a doctor and his account of Jesus' life is full of descriptions of Jesus healing people because of his compassion for them. He heals people physically but he also heals people emotionally, people who had been outcasts for various reasons are accepted and loved.

In fact all the gospels testify to Jesus healing, it also was a central part of his ministry reflecting the Every very nature of God. The first disciples servic continued to pray for the sick, and saw forwa wonderful miraculous healings, and at St. healin Andrew's we continue this ministry.

We do this in a number of ways. We regularly pray in the church intercessions and in our own homes for people who ask for their names to be placed on the news sheet. If you would like us to be praying for you in this way please let us know and we will be glad to do so.

This year we have joined with Christians all over the UK to pray for a young lady who in her early 30's was diagnosed with an aggressive form of brain cancer. After she had an operation to remove what they could of the tumour the cancer immediately grew back with new tumours in addition. Medically speaking there was no hope. However after continuous faithful prayers of many, over a many months she is now free from any sign of cancer, and what is even more wonderful, she has also come into a personal relationship with God. We continue to pray for her and for others believing in God's goodness and power to heal.

We also have a prayer ministry team who will pray for individuals after each service about any concerns they may have, including prayers for healing. We do not always see physical healing, sometimes I think because we have much to learn about how to pray, but sometimes because God answers our prayers in other ways, giving peace or strength, or a knowledge of his love.

On February 10th at 3pm we will be holding a healing service. This will be a quiet reflective service with the singers leading our worship. We will focus on healing in its widest sense including physical healing but

also spiritual and emotional healing. Everyone is very welcome to this. During the service there will be opportunity to come forward and receive anointing with prayer for healing, but you are also welcome simply to come into God's healing presence by just being there in the atmosphere of worship.

Often it's as we worship that we are healed. Last Sunday someone had a picture, an image from God, of the congregation singing and praising and as they sang bandages came off them. The bandages were representing hurts, pains through ill health, sins and ungodly behaviour that each person might have in their lives. When we focus on Jesus and worship him, he is able to take these from us.

The Bible says that it is by his wounds that we are healed. When Jesus died on the cross, all our sickness and shame was given to him as well as our guilt and sinfulness. It is through the cross of Christ that we receive healing.

That brings me to another special service that we are holding during Lent. We are holding our next Cafe Church on Sunday 24th February during which everyone will be helping to create a new focus for our prayer room. Everyone will be invited to make a ceramic cross as a way of identifying with the cross of Christ. The individual crosses will then be formed into one cross to remind us that Christ died for us all. As usual this service will start with breakfast, a simple

breakfast this time as it's during Lent, and once again everyone is very welcome.





In Memory of Allan 'Roy' Knapton 1931-2012

Roy was born in Slip End and attended the local school. On leaving school,

he decided to follow his father in the building trade, serving an apprenticeship at Moody's to become a plumber.

When called up to do his National Service, Roy joined REME, where his skills were put to good use and he learnt to drive. He had a great friend while doing his training, Ray Keen. While visiting Ray's home in Aylesbury he was introduced to Shirley and their friendship began. Roy was posted to Germany. He played football for REME and he was spotted by a scout for Ipswich Town but, because he had had cartilage problems, they would not sign him.

He kept in touch with Shirley while he was in Germany and they married on 27th March 1954, making their home in Markyate Road. They went on to have three daughters, Sandra, Lynne and Julie.

Roy also worked for SKF Co for 35 years. He was a keen gardener, loved playing darts, indoor bowls and dancing. He helped Shirley organise dances at the village hall.

About seven years ago it was discovered that Roy had three aneurysms of which one was operable, one harmless and the third too dangerous for an operation. Roy spent many months in and out of hospital and at home he was cared for by Shirley. Even though he was suffering, he still found times to have a joke!

Roy passed away peacefully in his sleep at home. He leaves a loving wife, three daughters, seven grandchildren and ten greatgrandchildren who will sadly miss him as will his other relatives and friends.







Gardener's Special

As the days start to lengthen and the weather improves we can get on with our gardening jobs at last and hopefully this year will not be so wet! Last year was an exceptionally bad year for gardeners but as most of us know, it happens, so if you are new to gardening don't be discouraged, dust yourself off and start all over again!

Lawns will need some attention after the rigours of winter, new lawns need a final raking of ground dug in the autumn to a fine tilth for sowing seed. Established lawns will benefit from a good scarifying with a lawn rake or an electric scarifier to remove dead grass, moss and thatch. Any worn areas can be reseeded and any sunken areas levelled and seeded to bring it back to a good condition for the year ahead. The first time you cut don't cut too short, lower the blades over the next few mowings. Trim and straighten edges angling the cut slightly away from you to avoid it crumbling away.

Plant roses early in the month and prune established plants during a frost free period, cutting out all dead wood and any branches crisscrossing to open up and shape the bush to a bowl shape. Don't be afraid of cutting a rose back too far as they benefit from a really good reduction of the previous year's growth to produce strong new shoots.

Dahlias and chrysanthemums over-wintered in the greenhouse will have shoots on them by now and cuttings can be taken when they are approximately 3 inches long.

Gladioli corms can be planted later this month and if sown over the next 6 weeks will give a longer flowering season. Sow between 4-6 inches deep and you will avoid the need of staking them. Sweet peas which were sown in autumn and over-wintered in pots or bought from a nursery will need to be planted out as soon as the weather permits. They

make an effective display when grown in clumps and supported with pea sticks or a cylinder of netting.

If you have any large clumps of snowdrops they can be dug up and split into small bunches and replanted straight away, but this should only be done about every fifth year.

Tomatoes sown last month under heat will need pricking out now or they will become weak and spindly. Finish pruning established fruit trees and bushes as soon as possible in the month.

Main crop Brussels sprouts can be sown early in the month in drills ½ inch deep for planting out at the end of April. Parsnips can also go in as soon as the soil is dry in drills ½ inch deep and 15 inches apart, if you sow 3 seeds at 6 inch spacing this will make it a lot easier when it comes to thinning out.

Early potatoes can be planted from the middle of the month 9-12 inches deep and 14 inches apart, but as they shoot above ground they will need to be protected from frost.

Onion sets can be planted towards the end of the month or early next month, but shallots should be planted as soon as possible if not already done.

Leeks can be sown this month for transplanting in June and summer spinach sown this month will be ready in May/June. Sow early rounded peas and broad beans until mid month.




