Slip End Parish Council - January 2019 Meeting in Brief By Sarah Minnighan

Cllr Minnighan chaired the meeting and advised members that she and Mr Prothero have meetings with several playground refurbishment companies later this month and hope to have quotations in February. At a later date these will be presented to the community in order that they may choose the best design to go with.

Cllr Minnighan also advised that after reporting the state of the kissing gates and parish signage to Central Bedfordshire Council she was pleased to see that their contractors had been to each site and cleaned and re-painted where necessary. Alfy Green is now Aley Green again. They missed the one gate on Front Street which she has reported again and hopes this will be attended to shortly.

The Slip End Website has recently been the unfortunate victim of hacking and as such it had to close down for a short time.

It is back up and running but in a reduced format whilst the Webmaster works behind the scenes to reload the site.

One resident sang the praises of the 230 bus route funded by CASE Trust that runs a route that enables residents from Caddington Woods and other stops within the parish to get in and around, including reaching Luton Airport Parkway. that they will be re-submitting their planning application for land at the end of Markyate Road. Cllr Minnighan advised them that the council hadn't received any detailed plans or application at the time of the meeting and couldn't comment on it until then.

We have been asked to remind Businesses, Clubs and Private Individuals who advertise in or on public sites, lampposts or street furniture to remove posters etc. after the events to avoid the neighbourhood becoming cluttered with unsightly items. The Council does have powers to remove all unofficial notices if the situation continues. (Ed)

In the September issue of Parish News we offered some extracts from a earlier edition published in 1989. Some readers may remember, but for many these extracts may add interest to their awareness of the past in Slip End

Around 1935 it was usual each Sunday for a group of twelve to fifteen year old lads to kick a tennis ball in the streets near the Royal Exchange, now The Frog and Rhubarb. There was little traffic, no lamps and the streets were the usual playground. The youngsters made good use of this emptiness. Some Senior Citizens must have felt this activity inappropriate and on their way back from church called the local policeman. He took the names of the boys who found themselves arraigned before the Magistrates in the local Juvenile Court accused of causing a nuisance to pedestrians by kicking a ball in the streets. In defence the lads said that there was no playing field or anywhere to kick a ball around.

On the Bench was Lady Ludlow, owner of Luton Hoo and known to the boys. She, and the other members of the Bench, decided that there would not be a conviction, but costs of three shillings each should be paid.

Teddy Baldock, whose memorial is in St Andrew's Church, following his death on the beach at Anzio in WW2, asked for time to pay. This little cameo must have burned deep into the mind of another of the lads because 25 years later and still with an overwhelming desire to see Slip End have a Playing Field, he became deeply involved with the Village Hall Trustees and others to secure land for recreational use.

His Name? Peter Edwards.

Well, Well , Well! Whoever would have thought it?

Pepperstock existed long before Slip End! Never a village, but a hamlet consisting of small groups of cottages spread over a wide area including Gibraltar Cottages, Luton Hoo farms and West Hyde. To the South were Broomhill Leys, Small Grove and Bonner's Farms which were mentioned in The Doomsday Book and in Fry's Book of Martyrs. This entry is probably included because of the infamous Bishop Bonner a' dastard of the darkest dye'.

The remains of the site of Bonners stocks into which his unfortunate victims were strapped and left to the elements, presumably to perish, were able to be seen by many later generations.

A group of four cottages remained from an original group of six and were altered into a single dwelling named Pepsal End Manor which became the home of Colonel and Mrs Rattigan, parents of Terrance Rattigan whose famous stage productions include "The Winslow Boy" and "French Without Tears".

At the road junction was the pond on which homemade boats were sailed and The Half Moon Inn. There had been an inn on this site for 450 years until two national brewers bought the business. They were unable to secure planning permission to enlarge the kitchen area on to Green Belt land to provide for a larger and now necessary economic number of guests and so it remained closed and deteriorating for some years.

Apart from the frontage, the premises were almost completely taken down in 2014 and are now the home of Harpers Foods.

To the North was the area latterly known as Slip End, but more about that later!

Alex's Rucksacks are a hit!

10 year old Alex from Rossway has been doing his bit to help the homeless over the Christmas and New Year period by buying and filling rucksacks to give to those folk in need. His contributions are distributed through the charity Signposts, Luton and their Start Over Shelter project.

Alex decided in 2017 that he wanted to do something to help homeless people in and around our area and after a very successful campaign he decided that he would do it all over again this year!

Armed with his business plan he wrote to lots of companies and Jan Fowler at John Lewis Welwyn Garden City invited Alex along to meet her and tell her what his plans were. From that meeting Jan offered John Lewis's help under their Community Christmas Project, and donated 50 rucksacks. Alex bought 28 more with money donations, and then the ball started rolling.

Alex reached out to friends, family, his scout group, Caddington & Slip End Scouts got involved, and soon Alex was receiving all the necessities he needed to fill his rucksacks, from toothpaste to sanitary products, shower gel to hats, gloves and other toiletries as well as money to buy the rucksacks in the first place. Last year Alex won the Gordon Wellstead Award in Scouting for his efforts in helping the charity and said that winning that award made him want to achieve more this year, which he did

Last year Alex filled and supplied 19 rucksacks: this year he filled 78!

He delivered those rucksacks to **Signpost** with his foster parents Clare & Fred. Clare said she was 'overwhelmed by the support from businesses and the local communities, our friends and scouting and guiding families have all helped Alex achieve what he wanted to do'.

As the donations kept arriving Clare started to worry where they would put them all and next year they may need some extra help with the sorting and filling the rucksacks, but as Alex said, he's had an amazing experience, and knowing he's helped 78 people this year with some essentials makes him extremely happy.

So you think you're too clever, young or too wise to be the victim of SCAM?

Read on! You may be surprised

9 out of 10 on scammers lists do not know that they are targeted!

Scams are getting more and more sophisticated and there are more of them aimed at all types of people, not iust the older generation. One group of people who can be affected by scams and scammers are the 'socially isolated'. There are some unpleasant people out there, ready to ruin the lives of others. People usually think that older persons are the ones who get scammed, but research shows that 18 to 24 year olds are just as vulnerable.

Firstly, looking at the older generation or the disabled

Did you know? Although this group makes up the smallest number of reported scam cases, they have the highest level of detriment, not just financially but with an impact on health and wellbeing.

They are usually seen by scammers as the easiest targets, with victims less likely to report a scam or reach out for support.

Compared to the general population, if you are disabled or with long-term health conditions, you are more likely to fall victim to phishing/banking scams. prize draw lottery or scams and clairvoyant scams!

Another susceptible group is "the socially isolated".

They are seen as an easy target and therefore a group who should find 'advice' helpful. We hope the advice is genuine!

What about the younger members of the community?

Young people don't represent the largest group of people falling victim to scams, but there is evidence to show there has been a sharp increase in the number of under 25's hit by scams.



This group has grown up surrounded by technology and is confident using the internet, which may lead them to feel that they are unlikely to fall for scams, making them complacent and increasingly vulnerable.

Over half of 18-24s are unlikely to report a scam, making them the largest group who are unlikely to take any action

It has been reported that the names and addresses of approximately 300,000 people are on lists which are being sold between criminals to use as targets for mass-marketed mail scams and research has shown that 9 out of 10 people on these lists are unaware they are even being targeted!



Whether as a victim or not, reporting and sharing a scam experience may help prevent others from falling victim and also help authorities to raise awareness and tackle these crimes.

If you ever suspect a scam, please tell everyone about it.

You may avoid falling for scams by asking yourself these 7 simple questions.

If you answer yes to any of the following, there's a good chance it's a scam.

- 1 An unsolicited call can be a sign of being contacted by a company you don't want to deal with. Be strong and refuse to give ANY reply.
- 2 If it sounds too good to be true-it probably is! Use your common sense.
- 3 NEVER give ANY personal information.
- 4 If they want an answer now, MAKE SURE IT IS NO.
- 5 Are the reply details vague? Such as an 09 telephone number(premium rate) or only a mobile number with unclear address.
- 6 You see simple spelling mustakes!
- 7 If you are told this is a special deal which you should keep to yourself avoid at once. Your suspicion is probably right and you are one of thousands with the same offer.

St Andrews Message February

This morning in my "Morning Prayer" I read in the appointed Psalm the following words:

God is our refuge and strength, an everpresent help in trouble.

Therefore we will not fear, though the earth give way...

fortress. (From Psalm 46v1, 2, 7)

We live in very uncertain times - on the global stage there is a world-wide shift in attitudes and relationships between nations. No one knows how Brexit will pan out and the effect it will have on our economy or our individual lives. It is much more difficult to maintain the illusion of control that we like to manufacture in order to give us a sense of security in our lives.

In reality we are all affected circumstances that are outside our control. Our lives can be turned upsidedown without warning as a result of illness or accident, redundancy or other people's words and actions. How do we retain a measure of equanimity in a changing and uncertain world?

Over the last couple of years I have found the putting into practice the advice of a little verse in the Bible to be very helpful.

When life feels out of control and things are happening that do not feel good we are faced with our powerlessness. This can cause anxiety. This call to pray empowers us - there is something we can do. The instruction to

keep giving thanks draws our attention to the many good things that are present in our lives. The verse is an invitation to live in God's world under his control. As we pray we are asking him to influence what happens - we are asking him to help us know how to live, to have the wisdom to make good decisions and to continue to live with love and hope.

This transforms our experience of The Lord Almighty is with us, God is our everyday life. Saint Paul, the writer of Philippians continues in the next verse with a beautiful promise.

> The peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus. (Philippians 4v7)

> When we seek to live in God's world in God's way there is a peace that is beyond understanding - it is not dependent on circumstances - on whether our lives are easy and secure or filled with great challenge. It is dependent on the unchanging nature of God. He is our "refuge and strength, an ever-present help in trouble. He is with us and he is a fortress" in which we can dwell in peace despite the storms that may rage about us.

Can I end by encouraging us all to pray for our leaders, indeed the leaders of the world, that they might seek peace building strategies for but also to lift our own circumstances to God in prayer that we might dwell in his transcendent peace what-ever happens around us. God Bless,


