Gardening Notes

Well, a slightly better summer than last year, at least we had a few nice days here and there. Time now to get the garden sorted for the winter so you are ready for next season. Remove all annuals before they become too bedraggled. Most hardy perennials should be planted this month unless the soil is very wet in which case wait for a dry spell, or the soil will compact where trodden on. Cut Dahlias down to about six inches above ground level as soon as the frost blackens the leaves, then dig them up using a fork and try not to damage the tubers, dry in a frost free shed for about a week and plant in shallow trays with just enough peat or ash to cover the tubers and keep slightly damp, shoots will appear next spring. Sweet peas can be sown direct into the ground now or in pots from the middle of the month in a cold areenhouse, plant tulips and Hyacinths this month and into November. Tulips planted earlier may be damaged by frost and may suffer Tulip fire disease. Plant border Carnations and Pinks, space border Carnations about 15 -18 inches apart and Pinks 12 inches apart.

Chrysanthemums can either be left in the ground to over-winter but do not cut the tops down until spring, or lift the stools, cut the tops down and plant them at the same depth they were growing at in a cold frame or greenhouse and take cuttings in the spring but do remember to label them before lifting. Gladioli do not fare well if left in the ground to over-winter so lift them about the second week of the month and dry them off thoroughly then cut the stem just above the corm, the roots can be removed as soon as they are dry. Store them in a frost free environment and replant in the spring.

Cut out the canes that carried this year's fruit from Blackberries and Loganberries and summer fruiting Raspberries and tie in the new shoots to a wire or frame. Complete the planting of Strawberries this month for fruiting next year and clear all rubbish from established beds. Towards the end of the month plant (cont) all types of hardy deciduous trees and shrubs but not in frosty weather or strong winds.

If you have a pond you should be thinking about preparing it for the winter by drastically thinning out underwater oxygenating plants and remove old water lily leaves. This will avoid the presence of a great deal of decaying vegetation on the base of the pond when the water is iced over, and will minimise the formation of toxic gases and prevent a shortage of oxygen. If the water looks dark green or blackish, drain off half the volume and replace with fresh water.

The Gardening Club welcomes visitors to their meetings in the Village Hall (£2), why not make a note in your diary for 18 November and go along to hear Hugh Granger's talk "Can Plants Think". Well that's all for this month folks, see you again in November.

Operation Christmas Child 2019

We have been busy at St Andrew's collecting and covering shoeboxes and meeting up every other Tuesday to make, sew or knit items that we could put in the shoeboxes. This year it has been decided by Samaritans Purse that unfortunately sweets will no longer be allowed to be sent in the boxes, due to Customs Regulations, and also toothpaste will no longer be acceptable, so please ensure that if you were to kindly make up a shoebox you do not include any sweets or toothpaste.

Operation Christmas Child 2019



It's four years since I visited Belarus to help distribute shoeboxes and I often think of the children I met on that visit. Lena on the left told me it was the best day of her life and she would always remember the gift of her shoebox from strangers in the UK. The young girl on the right lived in a Social Centre where children stay if their parents are unable to care for them properly, usually due to drink or drugs or addiction of some sort. If, after six months they are still there they could well be offered for adoption. I do hope she was able to return home and is happy. I remember all the children so well.

The shoeboxes are so important to a child who has nothing, so if you would like to make your own 'love in a box' we do have some leaflets at St Andrew's to explain how to make your box up or you can go to www.samaritans-purse.org.uk for details.

Boxes can be dropped off at the church before 11th November or taken to Heathfield Community Centre in Caddington, which is a collection point for again this year.

If you have a child or children who are going along to the Holiday Fun Day on Your box Friday 25th October they will be helping who receive with shoeboxes there. On November 3rd the one if poss Church will be holding their Shoebox Sunday service and everyone is most *Thank you*. welcome.

In 2018 Over 10 million shoeboxes were collected for needy children and distributed to over 100 countries around the world.

If you would like to send a box, decide if it is for a Boy or Girl and which age group: 2—4 or 5—9 or 10—14

Boxes should be covered in Christmas or colourful paper with the lid covered separately. Select a medium to large 'wow' item for your child, then fill the box with other fun toys, school supplies, knitted hat and gloves and soap, flannel and toothbrush.

It would be good to include a personal note and a photo if possible as that makes a big impact on the child who receives the box. Finally include £5 donation to help with the cost of transport (this can be done online through Samaritans Purse if you would rather do that, as you can also 'Follow Your Box' to see where it goes). Then bring your box to Church or Heathfield Community Centre in Caddington between 11th to 18th November.



Your box can bring so much joy to the child who receives it so please consider sending one if possible.

Planning Application

- CB/19/02181/FULL Woodside Farm, Woodside Change of use agricultural building to B2 use and associated recladding, removal of shipping containers adjacent and formation of car parking area, and new landscape planting.
- Cllr. Hooker said he had visited the site and passed around pictures of the scaffolding business currently located on the site, as well as arial photos of the entire site.
- He said he would be minded to support the application if it was for B1 use, which are offices, research and development of products and processes, or, most importantly, light industry appropriate in a residential area.
- After a short discussion, it was agreed to object to this Planning Application on the grounds of;
- 1. Being industrial use in an area that is primarily residential housing and agricultural use, especially as it is for B2 use and not B1 use.
- 2. It is Green Belt land.
- 3. Potential for noise and disturbance in addition to that to that associated with the current scaffolding business.
- 4. Potential movement of large vehicles associated with industrial use, especially safety issues, as the entrance is next to a bend in the road.

4pm Service

We are trying something new at St Andrew's.


We know that people may want to come to church but find it too difficult to attend a Sunday morning service. Some people have told me that it just takes them too long to get going in the morning, others say it is the only day they get a lie in after a busy week. For others there is the commitment to children's sporting activities, swimming lessons, or wanting to invest in a healthy outdoor lifestyle. At St Andrew's we thought that instead of bemoaning the situation or trying to guilt-trip people why not offer a service at a different time?

So this is what we are going to try. We are introducing a monthly service on a Sunday afternoon. The time is **4 pm.**.

The service is open to anyone. It will be suitable for young families and older people alike. There is no target demographic.

The format is likely to change over time but we want it to be recognisably church so it will have songs and prayers, a bible story and a reflection on that story. We plan to incorporate crafts, fun and games (somehow?!) but no one will be press-ganged into taking part so opportunities for quiet contemplation will run alongside that.

Have you been meaning to explore coming to church but couldn't make Sunday mornings? Have you had a break and worry it's too late to come back now? Are you curious about what we get up to down at St A's? Why not come along to the 4pm service?



St. Andrew's Church Organ Restoration

Many in the community will have enjoyed the organ music at St. Andrew's, at weddings, funerals, Remembrance Services and other special services. The organ is original to the church and dates back to the 1890's. Although being generally maintained and tuned over that time, it is now in need of 'Intensive Care' treatment. This of course comes at a cost, about £12,000.



It will be wonderful to bring the organ back to full working order once again. We would like to invite anyone who wishes to contribute to this work to make donations payable to 'St. Andrew's Church, Woodside PCC'.

These can be posted in the church porch letter-box or to our treasurer, Julie Taylor, at 25, Crawley Close.

St. Andrew's Church was built in 1889 thanks to the generosity of Mr J S Crawley. It is in the 'Early English ' style by architects J R Brown and Son. At first the musical instrument used in the Church was an harmonium similar to the one shown here!



The organ was installed later as indicated above and was built by Bishop and Sons of London. They started business in 1795 and soon became respected as one of the finest organ builders in England. James Bishop believed that attention to detail and fine craftsmanship were always to be of the highest standard possible.

The instrument in St. Andrew's has two manuals (keyboards) and uses tracker action, which is a mechanical action coupling keys and pedals for corresponding notes. It has eight speaking sets of pipes, with four on each manual. What is seen by the congregation is only a small part of the instrument. There are pipes for each note and timbre and so only a few of these can be positioned at the viewing side of the organ.



All Saints Church Caddington Christmas Tree Festival

This beautiful event is held on alternate Years in December in our lovely Church, the first one being held in 2003. It is open to the public on a Friday, Saturday and Sunday around the middle of December, finishing the festival with a magical Carol Service

The origin of this event was suggested by the late Jean Rix. She had seen a Christmas Tree Festival held in another church and thought it was something that Caddington could do.

We have music playing in the background. Either Pat Batchelor and Friends on Keyboard, or CDs with a Christmas theme. A Raffle is held over the weekend, with the winners announced on the Sunday evening after the Service.

Refreshments are available throughout the festival, and mulled wine & Christmas cake are served at the Carol Service.

We average around 50 Christmas trees at each festival, each one having a theme chosen by the individual or organisation taking part .In past years we have had some traditional and some alternative entries eg: Star Wars Theme; Pair Trees; Key Rings Tree; Money Tree; Tree of Peace; Victorian Theme; Sweet Tree; Dentistree; Militree; Gold Tree; Knitted 12 Days of Christmas and many others.

There are voting slips for people to choose their favourite.

This year we are calling the event *Nativity Scenes and Trees* to give more scope for some people to incorporate Nativity Scenes big or small. The event dates are $13^{th}/14^{th}/\&$ 15^{th} December this year. We can only imagine what people will come up with- i.e.: scenes/figures made out of Stones, Play-do, Lego, cardboard, tin cans, wool the list is endless and open to interpretation. Letters are sent out to villagers who have participated previously, and also any new organisations and businesses, inviting them to join this magical and beautiful event.

Please come along this year to visit a magical display of Nativity Scenes and Christmas Trees within our lovely Church.

What's in a name? By Keith Holme

I recently returned to a most beautiful small village in order to meet a friend of many years. As I approached the village from Andover passing St Peter's Church where it is believed, from some rather obscure records, that a place of worship has stood since the 1300's A little further on, round a sharp bend in the lane I passed over the River Anton. At this point the river widens out and its grassy banks provide some wonderful opportunities for play, or simply sitting to watch the world go by. All so very attractive with homes ,some of which housed tradesmen's workplaces in the past, spread along both sides of the road.

Why does it bear the somewhat unfortunate name of GOODWORTH CLATFORD?

As always this is steeped in history. The whole area surrounding the village of Goodworth and its neighbour Upper Clatford has records going back before Roman times. Indeed the local Bury Hill Iron Age Fort goes back some 5/600 years to Celtic times. Why such names? These are of Anglo Saxon derivation with the Goodworth coming from 'Goda's Enclosure' about whom nothing is now known and Clat-ford being 'the place where the burdock grows'. All this prompted me to look into the history of such a small but historic place and a rewarding experience it became. There is little space here to record all that is believed to have taken place even since Roman times here or in the neighbouring villages of The Wallops, both Upper and Middle and Thruxton, now the home of motor racing and other sporting activities. The descriptions of life in the past have always been of interest to me. I love to try and understand how places developed, the hardships endured and the opportunities grabbed to prosper. I am no trained historian and must rely upon the opus of others to help in this fascinating endeavour. In addition to the ancient history available there are the more modern events to which we can relate. The coming of the 'Sprat and Winkle' railway as early as 1858 is such an example of the rate of change previously unknown in such places. In more recent times the imminent closure of the Village Shop and Post Office brought the community together to form a co-operative with shares being offered to Villagers who ensured that the business would continue. It does not compete with the larger stores. but offers a range of goods and services which are tailored to the local needs. Help is through one paid manager who is assisted by volunteers seven days each week. This is a community which will not be beaten by cuts in services (cont. overleaf)



Looking back through some records of Goodworth life I came across this sad episode in the *Andover Advertiser*.

Being so far to the west the Village was unexpectedly **hit** by a stray 'doodlebug' which destroyed some homes in the centre and .made necessary the eventual demolition of the Royal Oak pub and the Village School.

Staying in the Royal Oak that night, having only arrived hours earlier from bomb hit London, were William and Cecily Jones and their 17 month old son. They had taken the opportunity of a short holiday to stay in this quiet spot before returning to London .. Together with three others they were killed instantly. The owner of the pub found himself falling through the floor after his bed-boards gave way and landed behind his own bar. He suffered a few cuts and grazes, but took two days to find his false teeth!

The area deserves more than space permits here, but I hope it may encourage others who fondly remember their ' special ' places to share them with us in PN.






Slip End Book Club
